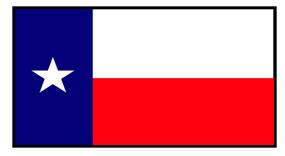

Sugar, Citrus, Vegetables, Cattle

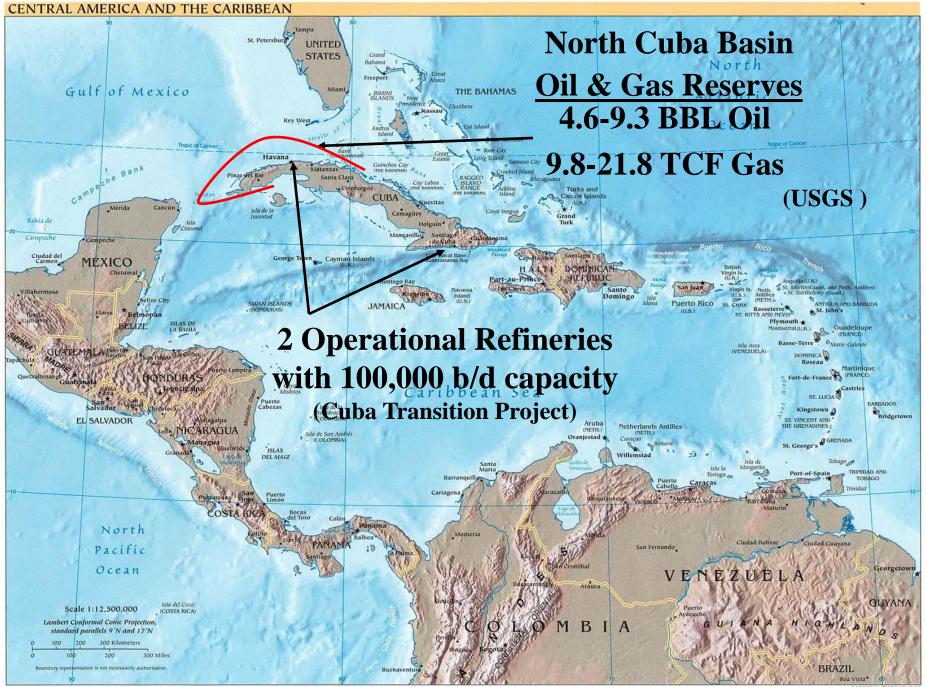
 Trade Sanctions Reform & Export Enhancement Act, 2000, Allows US Exports

Top 25 Market for US Agriculture & Forestry

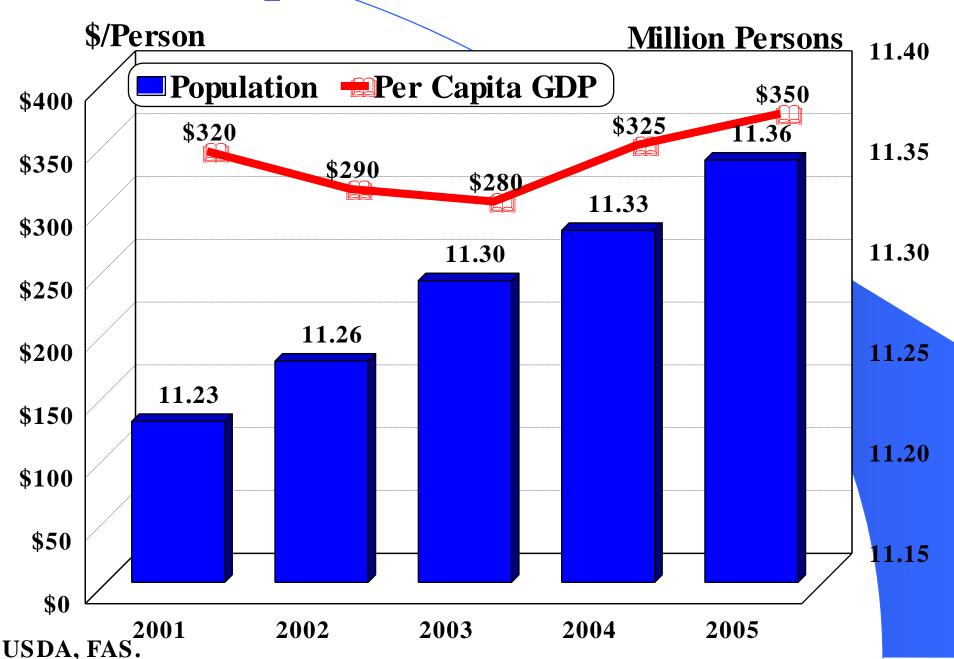
- Govt Agency, *Alimport*, Buys All Food
- Top Cuban <u>Exports</u>: Sugar, Nickel, Tobacco, Fish, Citrus
- Top Cuban <u>Imports</u>: Petroleum, Food, Machinery, Chemicals

Market Prospects

- 2004-2006 Strong Economic Growth (5.4%-7.5%)
 - Spurred by Tourism, Higher Sugar, Citrus & Nickel Prices
- Cuba is Far From Self-Sufficient in Food, But Lacks Strong, Consistent Purchasing Power
- Debt Overhang: \$15.4 Billion, 40% of GDP 2005 Cuban Food Imports Reached \$750 Million
- \$336 Million from United States, 42% Market Share
- Politics Dominate



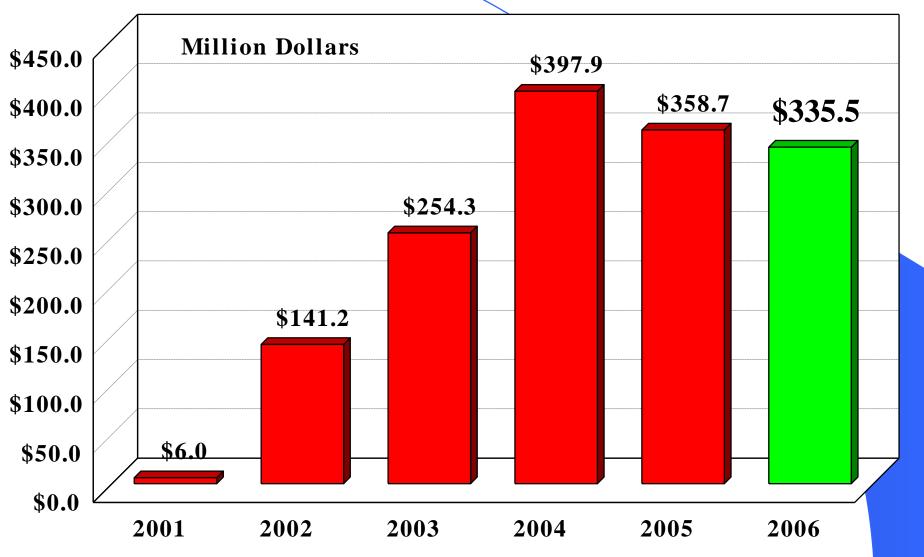
Cuba: Population & Income Growth



Tourism in Cuba

- Cuba Number Two Caribbean Tourist Destination-Creates Food Demand Economic Contribution is 12% of GDP
 About 1 Million U.S. Tourists Projected
 - If Travel Restrictions Are Lifted
- Additional U.S. Food Exports of \$200 Million Annually Required to Support U.S. Tourism when/if Travel Restrictions Lifted

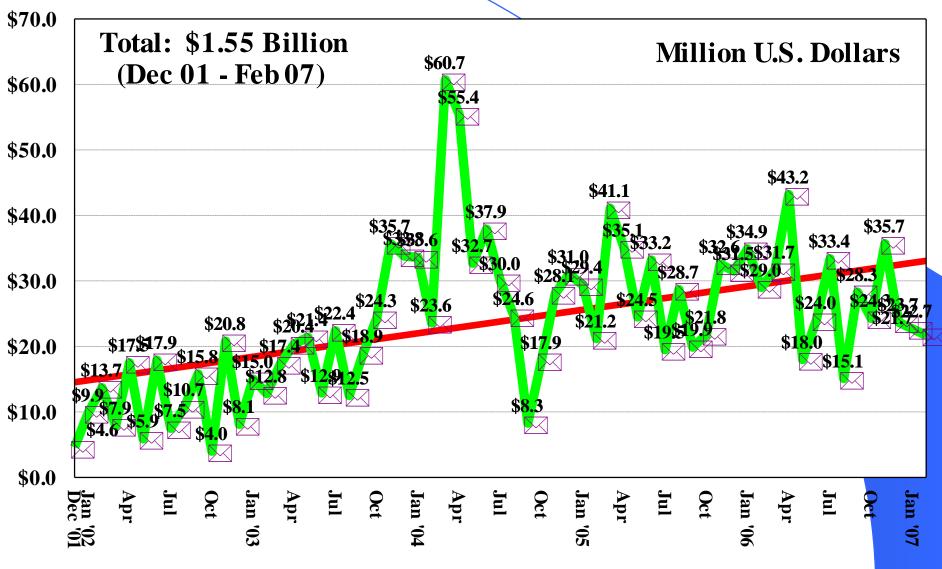

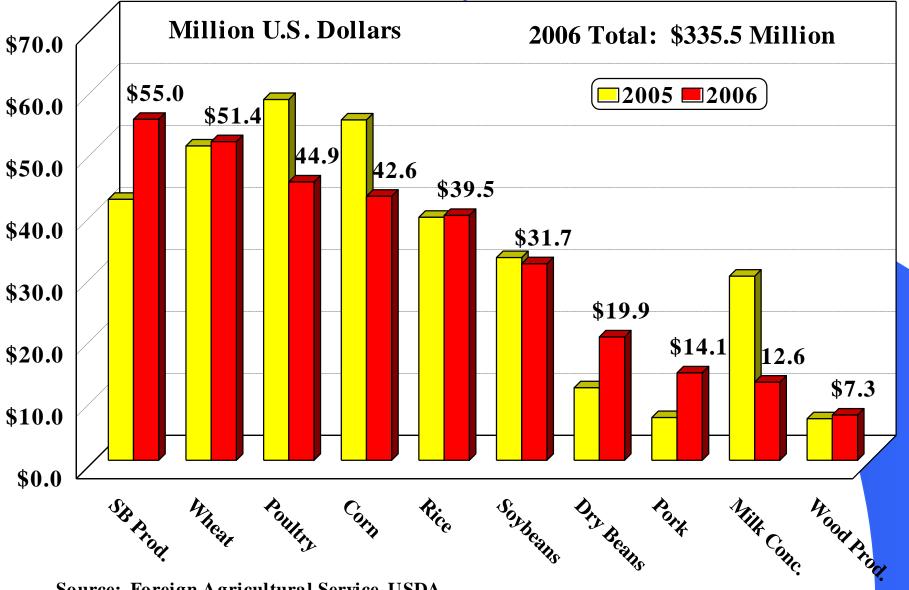


U.S. Monthly Exports of Agricultural and Related Products to Cuba



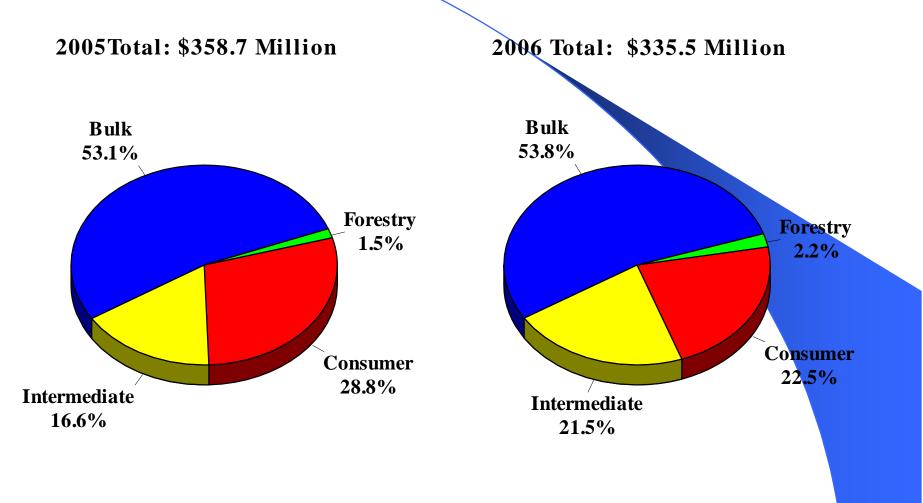

U.S. Ag and Related Exports to Cuba, 2005 & 2006



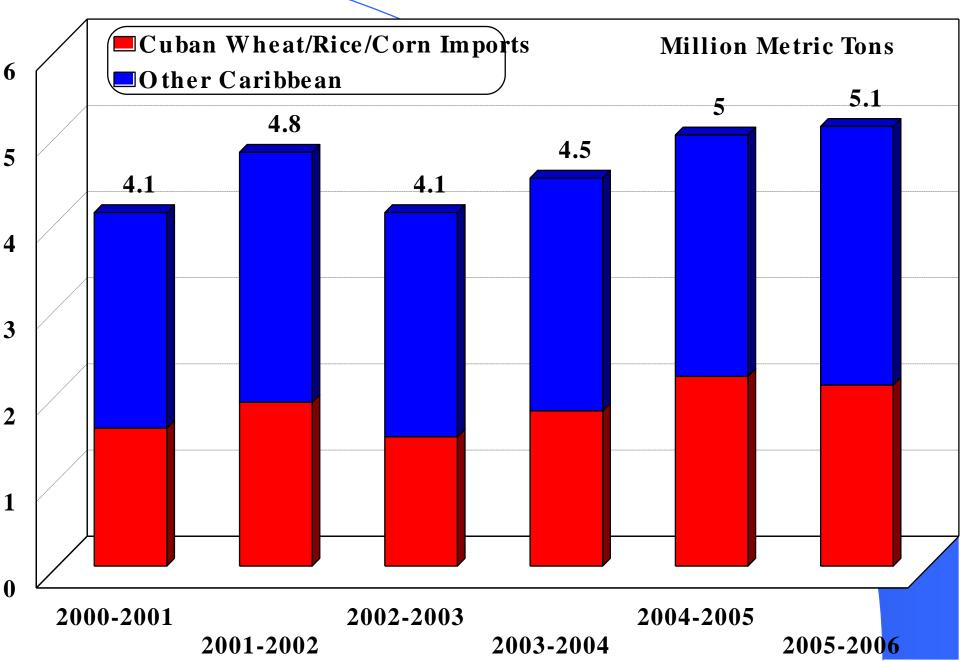

Composition of U.S. Agricultural and Forestry Exports to Cuba, 2005 & 2006

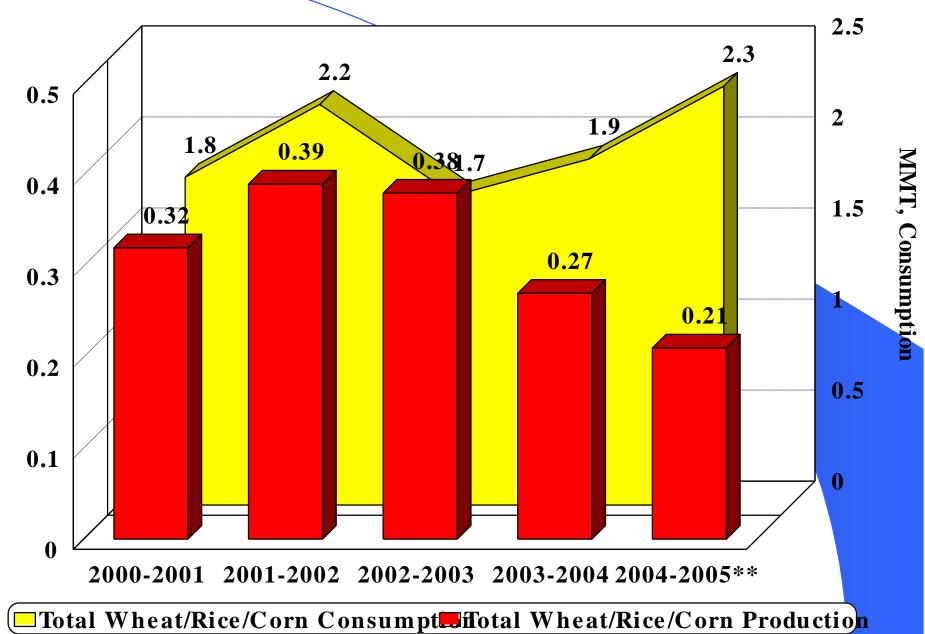

Cuban Share of Caribbean Grain Imports



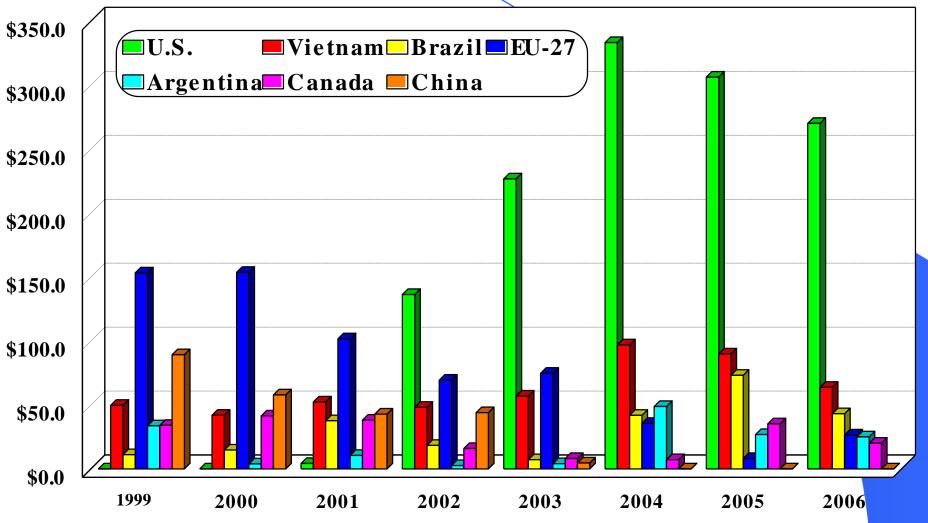

Exports of Selected Agricultural Products to Cuba, Selected Countries

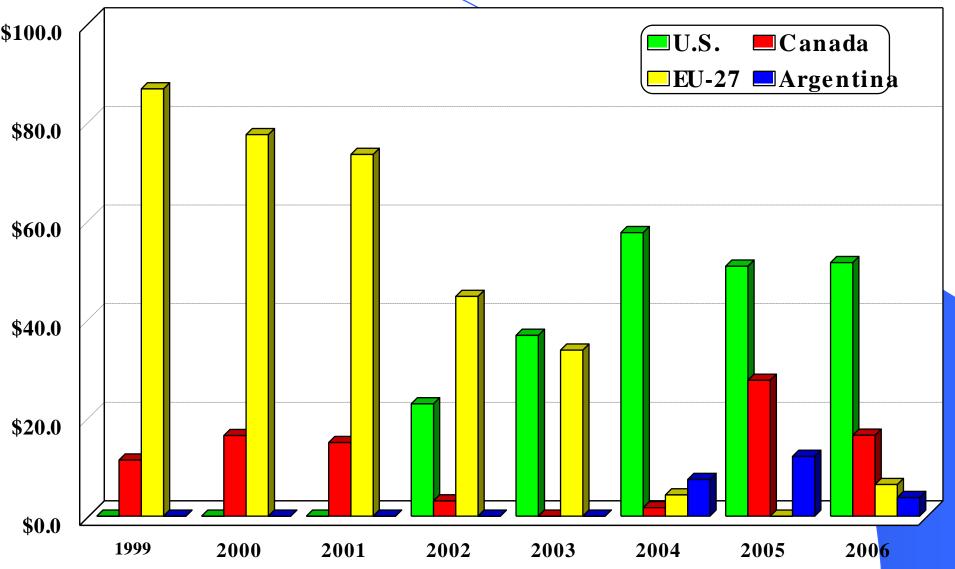

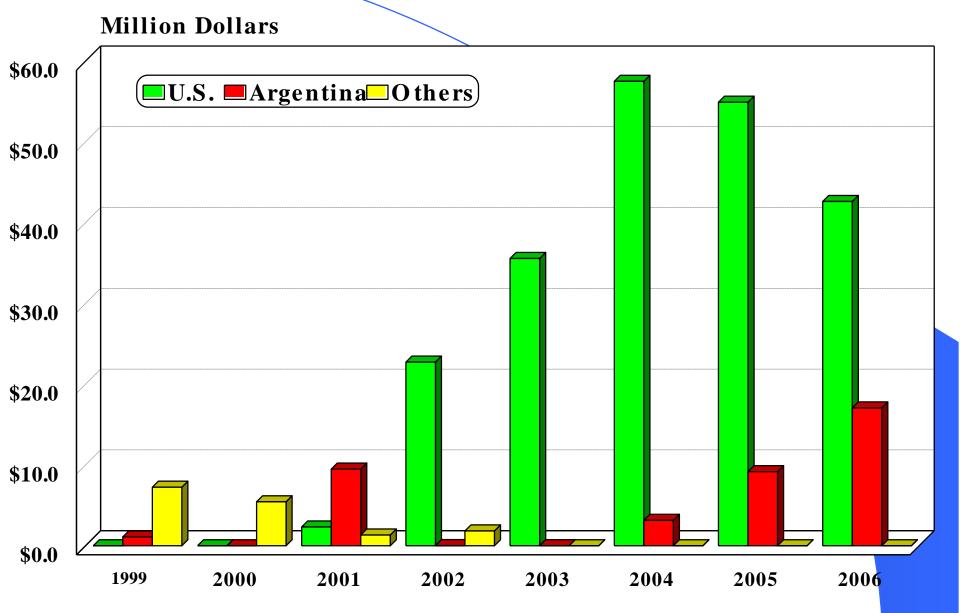
Exports of Wheat to Cuba, Selected Countries

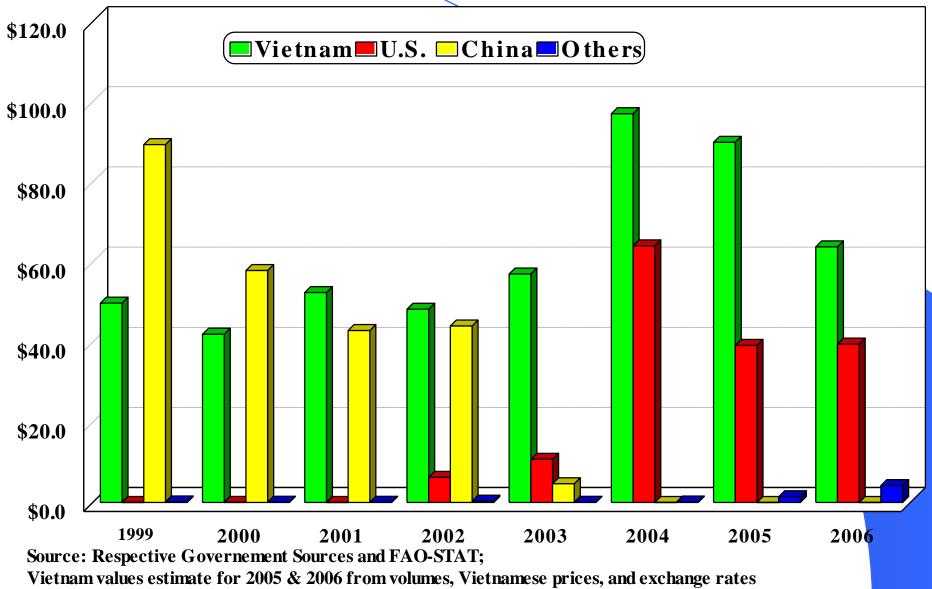
Exports of Corn to Cuba, Selected Countries

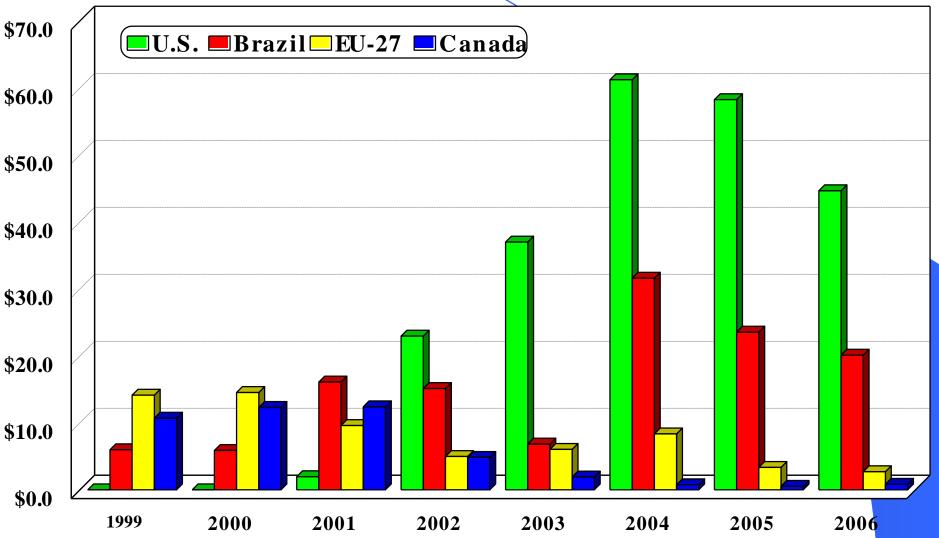
Exports of Rice to Cuba, Selected Countries
