## Overview of USDA Final Hemp Rule

- Effective March 22, 2021
- Sampling window increased from 15 days to 30 days before harvest.
- Modified where samples taken from the plant to allow more stems and leaves. IFR said top 1/3. FR says from the flowering tops of the plant by cutting 5-8" from the main stem (includes the leaves and flowers), terminal bud (occurs at the end of a stem), or central cola (cut stem that could develop into a bud).





#### Overview of USDA Final Hemp Rule (cont)

- Allows flexibility on sampling methodology from IFR specific protocol to allowing states to implement a "performance-based" method that must be approved by USDA & may consider:
  - Seed certification process
  - Whether producer is conducting research on hemp at institution of higher education or government funded.
  - Whether producer has consistently produced compliant hemp plants over a period of time.
  - Whether a producer is growing "immature" hemp such as seedlings, clones, microgreens, or other non-flowering cannabis.
  - Other similar factors

### Overview of USDA Final Hemp Rule (cont)

- Extends waiver of DEA-registered laboratory testing requirement through 12/2022.
- Increased safe harbor standard for negligence from .5% to 1%.
- Maximum number of negligent violations a producer may receive in a growing season is 1.





## Overview of USDA Final Hemp Rule (cont)

- USDA Final Rule allows for either remediation option.
  - Remediation
    - May remove & destroy flowering material and retest stalk, stems, leaf, seed and re-test.
    - May shred entire plant to create biomass-like material and re-test.
- USDA Final Rule allows for disposal by:
  - Plowing under
  - Mulching/composting
  - Disking
  - Shredding with bush mower or chopper
  - Burying
  - Burning
  - Remediation

#### Conclusion

- Many amendments allow more flexibility for producers.
- Important to watch how your State or Tribe implements these into their state statutes and regulations.
- Several controversial regulations were not changed.
  - Total THC still required measurement.
  - THC content limitation remains at .3%.
  - Whole-plant sampling still not allowed.
